Piquant Piquenique

Piquenique wines is the brainchild of Tess Bryant and Niccolo Coturri. Together, they produce beautiful fruit pet-nats (short for *petillant naturel*, which roughly translates to naturally sparkling) made from apples, grapes, pears, quince, plums, medlar, and blackberries. The fruit is sourced from organic farms and historic orchards on San Juan Island as well as neighboring Waldron Island and a mainland orchard near Bellingham. The goal is to capture the freshness of fruit and feature the broad array of appley-ness from the different farms and orchards. Everything is hand-picked, processed, and produced without additions - no added sugars, colorants, yeasts, oak, or sulfites at any time ever. Everything is fermented and aged in glass or stainless steel, and nothing will be disgorged. Bottled to be fizzy and fresh, and available from Ursa Minor's wine shop on Lopez Island. New App, New Visitor Center

Outdoor enthusiasts can explore more efficiently with a new app from the National Park Service that consolidates information for all 423 NPS sites into one user-friendly hub. Now, rather than

downloading individual apps for each park to access useful resources, people can simply open the National Park Service app and get answers or whichever spot they're curious about, like the San Juan Island National Historical Park and the new visitor center at American Camp. Park hours, visitors' centers, and maps are available on the app. The National Park Service will replace the 40+-year-old visitor center at the American Camp Unit in the same location with a visitor information and orientation facility designed with an exterior plaza, gathering and demonstration space, and picnic areas. The new visitor center was co-developed alongside affiliated tribes and will have the most robust storytelling of Coast Salish peoples in the San Juan Islands. A Centennial Summit

The new Summit Visitor Center at Moran State Park on Orcas Island will be opening this spring. just in time for Moran's Centennial Celebration on June 18th. As the name suggests, the new Visitor Center will be on the summit of Mt. Constitution, the highest point in the San Juan Islands. Much of the new center's wood comes from Moran itself-trees that blew down in a windstorm and were locally milled for use in the park. Inside will be interpretive panels telling the story of the natural history of Mt. Constitution, like the only lodgepole pine forest in the Islands and the infamous piebald deer. Nearby is a stone observation tower built by the Civilian Conservation Corps in 1936. With nearly a 360° view of the surrounding islands, the Cascade Mountains, and sometimes even the Olympics. Moran is the fourth largest state park in Washington at over 5,000 acres. Shipbuilding tycoon Robert Moran, inspired by John Muir, made an initial donation of approximately 3,000 acres to the state in 1921. The park has since grown into an Orcas Island favorite where you can sample nature in all its facets-forest, five freshwater lakes, waterfalls, wildflowers, birds (eagles, ravens, other woodland birds), and more than 38 miles of trails for hiking, mountain biking, and horseback riding. Moran is open yearround for camping and day use, and you can reserve ahead online or check at the park entrance for availability. Reservations necessary from Memorial Day through Labor Day. New Baby, New Hope

The Center for Whale Research is thrilled to confirm that a new calf, L125, has been born into the Southern Resident killer whale community. L125's size and shape are typical of a calf in good physical condition and was estimated to be between four and six weeks old at the time. L125's mother is L86, named Surprise due to her own surprise birth, and also has an older brother, L106, born in 2005. L125 is the first calf born into L pod since January 2019 and joins the two born into J pod in late 2020, J57 and J58. J57, known as Phoenix, is a young male born to J35 Tahlequah who made headlines in 2018 when she carried her deceased neonate for 17 days and over 1,000 miles. J58 Crescent was recently confirmed to be female, providing an additional shot of hope for this critically endangered population. For more details: www.whaleresearch.com/I125

Podcast of the Pods

SeaDoc Society is excited to announce a new limited podcast series, <u>Pod of Orcas: Saving</u> <u>Southern Resident Killer Whales</u>, debuting April 1 on all podcast apps. Only 75 Southern Resident Killer Whales remain in the wild, and they're looking directly at extinction if things don't change. They are emotionally intelligent animals with complex family dynamics and a deep spiritual connection to the tribes and First Nations who've been in the Salish Sea since time immemorial. The six-episode series features amazing guests and will explore salmon, noise, contaminants, history, culture, and what we could learn from the conservation of other charismatic species like mountain gorillas. Kelp for Orcas

Visitors to Orcas Island will notice a new addition as they arrive on the ferry this summer—the Orcas Island Marine Interpretive Area. A metal kelp forest climbs the wall, cradling a crab, and makes for a unique selfie spot as well as protection for the wall. Zack Leck, an artisan blacksmith, created the kelp and crab. Sculptor Bruce Myers has designed pavers with stainless steel raindrop inlays, and six boulder-like benches will be installed later this spring. Two interpretive signs are being installed along with a flexible art and education board to showcase the variety of marine environment projects across the County.

A Light on Patos

Since 1893, a light has been shining from Patos Island, the northernmost island of the San Juan archipelago. Built to guide ships through treacherous waters, the lighthouse was also a happy home for many, including Edward Durgan and his family in the early 1900s. Boundary waters smugglers and rumrunners once visited the island to stash their contraband, and it was a front-line guard for the nation during World War II. Operated for 81 years by the U.S. government, the light was automated in 1974 and is now maintained by the Coast Guard. The Alchemy of Collaboration

When Washington's stay-at-home order went into effect last March, Alchemy Art Center got to work creating a community mosaic that islanders could participate in from home. The project, a 15-foot salmon made up of about 240 individual tiles, was intended to create a feeling of connection and collaboration during an incredibly difficult and isolated time for everyone. The salmon image was chosen for its key role in our Salish Sea ecosystem and a symbol of our interdependence. Now, one year later, that first quarantine salmon is glazed, assembled, and proudly installed on the main art building at Alchemy. This summer, Alchemy is bringing this project to the San Juan Islands Sculpture Park. Every Sunday from June 20 to September 19, visitors to the Park can find Alchemy Art Center Director Maria Michaelson facilitating a tile creation station. Participants will be able to create a unique clay tile to be incorporated as one of the hundreds making up what will ultimately be a freestanding, double-sided sculpture permanently installed at the Park. Honoring the Next 7 Generations...Online

Last summer, Samish leaders said after successfully holding their tribal business meetings virtually, they decided to try moving their cultural program online as well. The Samish cultural programs, called Chelángen, preserve the Samish people's traditions, culture, and language. In addition to an ancestral lineage language class, the tribe also offers a host of other classes for Samish citizens. A popular Samish history class is taught by the tribal chairman along with beading classes, drum-making classes, traditional medicine, blanket making, cedar harvesting, a "chat and craft" time where people can work on their own projects but together virtually, and many others. Samish citizens are widely dispersed geographically, but many live in the tribe's traditional territories of the western San Juan Islands and nearby.
